Course Outline/Overview

The purpose of this project is to guide teachers on how to implement flexible seating within their classrooms. It is meant to encourage teachers to implement a nontraditional seating arrangement in their classrooms in order to promote academic success, healthier lifestyle and positive behavior. In this project, students are offered the option of deciding their own seating arrangement on a daily basis.

"If we truly want to prepare our students for the real world, we need to put them in responsive, dynamic environments that reflect life outside of a traditional classroom. And what's that life outside like? Full of choices, where adults are responsible for their own learning. As a college student visiting my classroom once said, "It's like you're treating them like little adults." And as my teaching has changed, my classroom design needed to change right along with it."

What is Flexible Seating?

A classroom with flexible seating arrangements gives students the option of selecting a seating arrangement that is suitable to their needs. Flexible seating replaces traditional seating arrangements with nontraditional arrangements, such as balance balls and wobble chairs. It allows students the freedom to wobble, rock, bounce, lean or stand. This process increases oxygen flow to the brain, blood flow and core strength. It keeps our young minds focused and alert. Higher academic performance, better health and improved behavior have all been linked to physical activity incorporated through the use of flexible seating.

Nontraditional seating arrangements promote ownership over space and supplies. Flexible seating encourages students to share both. It encourages a sense of community. It allows students the ease to work in small groups, whole-group or in pairs without the burden of moving heavy desks or tables.

This type of seating arrangement allows students to be more comfortable, focused and motivated. Traditional seating arrangements have become simply boring. Flexible seating has allowed students to become involved in an experience that requires students to master skills such as problem-solving, collaboration, creativity, and responsibility.

Implementation of Flexible Seating

Before You Begin

First, discuss your plan of implementation with your administrator. You will need their approval and support.

Classroom Arrangement

Evaluate the size of your classroom. This will determine what seating arrangements you can use within your classroom. You should know how each piece of flexible seating will work within the plan of your classroom before you buy anything. Some furniture, such as desks and whole group tables you should keep in your classroom. You may want to think about where you would like your students to keep their materials and if supplies will be community supplies or not.

The flexible seating options I chose for students allow for them to move their seating to where they are wanting or needing to work with their group members. Our classroom environment allows us to easily and seamlessly collaborate.

<u>Classroom Management</u>

A strong classroom management plan is essential for this to work successfully. Some anchor charts reminding students of the rules and expectations are helpful tools. You may create these charts along with your students.

A flexible seating student contract is another way to make your students accountable. You should also send a letter home informing your parents of your seating arrangements.

You must introduce one type of seating at a time. You do not want to overwhelm your students. I think this is an important step in the process. Each student must use each type of seating several times.

You have to let your students experience each type of flexible seating, one at a time and then understand how it's works.

Enforce your rules. Don't forget to be firm, be consistent, and be fair. You will have to give your students a chance to prove themselves.


Funding

Lesson Plan

SS.1.C.1.1 Explain the purpose of rules and laws in the school and community.

Objective: Students will write and illustrate a flip book about rules and responsibilities that they are to follow during flexible seating.

Materials:

Promethean board Flip books crayons/colored pencils anchor charts

Day 1

Instructions:

Share pictures/videos of classrooms with flexible seating.

Create an anchor chart to guide your students.

Discuss each of the rules.

Give examples of what each rule means exactly.

Introduce the seating arrangements in your classroom.

Discuss the rules for each seating arrangement.

Day 2

Introduce and explain the following vocabulary:

*smart seat- is a seat that allows you to do your work to the best of your ability.

*options-something that you may pick or choose

*community supplies-supplies to be shared by students in class

*privilege- a special right or benefit given to a person.

*contract-an agreement between two or more people

Students will create a flip book. They will write and illustrate each rule.



After each child has completed their flip book, have read and sign the Flexible Seating contract. Review the rules frequently and when necessary.
